



Dog Days of Summer - Fun and Safety For All in Midtown

The Origin of Dog Days (excerpts from http://blog.dictionary.com)

Contrary to common conjecture, the dog days do not take their name from weather that "isn't fit for a dog," or heat that is so extreme it drives dogs mad. These folk etymologies shrink in comparison with the actual background of the phrase, a story of astronomical proportions.

In the most technical sense, dog days refer to the one- to two-month interval when a particularly bright star rises and sets with the sun, shining during the daylight hours and staying hidden at night, known by three names: Sirius, the Dog Star, and Alpha Canis Majoris. Apart from being the most prominent star in the constellation Canis Major (Latin for "Greater Dog"), this heavenly body is responsible for the origin of the expression dog days that has endured through millennia.

Humans have been griping about the weather as far back as written history reaches, and the dog days were an important time for all. The Ancient Greeks and Romans, in particular, had grim feelings for Sirius, associating it with an outbreak of insufferable heat and fever. Civilization has long credited the objects in the sky with influence over the earth and its inhabitants; if it's not the Dog Star cursing you with sultry summer heat and madness, it's the moon driving you to lunacy. It seems you can't win when it comes to the celestial bodies.



Heat Advisories and How to Keep Your Kids Safe

The extreme heat in the summer months, especially in the Valley, can pose significant threats to children and adults. Here are some tips to prevent heat-related injuries and illnesses:

- High temperature days can cause the temperature inside a vehicle to reach dangerous levels. Never leave a child alone in a car, truck or van. A car parked in direct sunlight for only 15 minutes can get to 131 to 172 degrees inside. High temperatures could lead to heat exhaustion or death.
- Cover metal parts of car seats in hot weather. Belt and harness buckles can cause serious burns to children.
- Limit children's time outdoors between the sun's peak intensity hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., keeping outside play to 30 minutes.
- Use sunscreen with an SPF of 25 or higher 15 to 30 minutes before going outside. Reapply every three to four hours, more often if swimming or sweating.
- Dress children in light weight, light colored, and loose fitting clothes. Hats (with brims and bills) and sunglasses help protect from the sun and ultraviolet light.
- Kids should drink 16 ounces of water every four to six hours. Additionally, sports drinks include a balance of minerals and vitamins which help to hydrate the body.
- Know the warning signs of heat exhaustion including headaches, dizziness, vomiting, muscle aches, paleness, heavy sweating, etc. Phoenix Children's recommends placing kids in a shady location with loose fitting clothes and lots of water. Seek medical attention if symptoms are severe, get worse, or last more than one hour.

Keep Pets Safe in the Heat: The Humane Society of the United States*

Practice basic summer safety

- Never leave your pets in a parked car Not even for a minute. Not even with the car running and air conditioner
- Watch the humidity Dogs' temperatures should not be allowed to get over 104 degrees.
- · Limit exercise on hot days Adjust intensity and duration of exercise. Always carry water with you.
- **Don't rely on a fan** Pets respond differently to heat than humans do. (Dogs, for instance, sweat primarily through their feet.)
- Provide ample shade and water Tree shade and tarps don't obstruct air flow. A doghouse... makes it worse.
- Cool your pet inside and out Whip up a batch of DIY peanut butter popsicles (or of another favorite food.) Keep your pet from overheating with a cooling body wrap, vest, or mat. If your dog doesn't find baths stressful, see if she enjoys a cooling soak.
- Watch for signs of heatstroke Some signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure, and unconsciousness.
- How to treat a pet suffering from heatstroke Move your pet into the shade or an air-conditioned area. Apply ice packs or cold towels to her head, neck, and chest or run cool (not cold) water over her. Let her drink small amounts of cool water or lick ice cubes. Take her directly to a veterinarian.
- Prepare for power outages Create a disaster plan to keep pets safe from heat stroke and other temperaturerelated trouble.

Midtown History Moment: Monterey Medical Plaza By Derek D. Horn



On Monterey Way east of Central Avenue is a collection of small one-story office structures that line both sides of the street. This collection of nine buildings houses primarily medical offices. Though located in a major commercial district, this group would not look out of place in a residential neighborhood. It has its roots in both early growth along Central Avenue and in

later Midtown development.

In 1895 an investment group created the Buena Vista tract that was bounded by Central Avenue, Thomas Road, 7th Street, and Osborn. For decades, this area remained primarily agricultural. In 1940, Thomas and Ella Wimsett, the owners of property on Central north of Earll, subdivided their land into 22 individual residential and commercial lots and created Monterey Way between



Central and about 1st Place. By the end of the decade houses lined both sides of Monterey.


By 1956, development that replaced farms and homes with offices and commercial buildings in Midtown was going

strong. That same year Drs. Lucille Dagres and Charles Kalil, along with contractor Al Couet, broke ground on a medical center on Monterey east of Central. This development was designed with a Southwestern motif, to blend into the adjacent residential neighborhood, and to provide a quiet, non-institutional atmosphere for both doctors and patients. It also extended Monterey to 3rd Street. Originally designed for five individual offices on each side of the street, by 1959 four were completed on the south side of Monterey and one on the north.

In 1967 renowned Phoenix architect Bennie Gonzales designed another building in the plaza for Drs. Henry and Alfred French who were father and son eye specialists.

By 1979 the Monterey Medical Plaza had expanded to its current nine buildings. The homes on East Monterey are long gone and the area now mostly commercialized, but the plaza has retained the residential character originally envisioned by its developers.



According to the US Census, nearly 20% of people identify themselves with a disability. While this number may seem exorbitant, it is increasing in size year after year. This is mainly because our population is getting older, and with aging comes increased health complications and, in addition, the survival rate of those born with disabilities has increased thanks to modern medicine.

While great strides have been made ensuring accommodations through laws such as the Americans with Disabilities Act, much work remains to be done. People with disabilities are more likely to be unemployed or underemployed than any other demographic. A lack of financial resources coupled with limited mobility leaves some with disabilities to live socially isolated, segregated lives. This segregation only feeds into a vicious cycle in which people are neither familiar nor comfortable with interacting with

people with disabilities. In fact, employer surveys have shown that lack of disability awareness is one of the leading factors in determining not to hire people with disabilities.

The fact is that, given the right accommodations, people with disabilities often outperform their counterparts in performing similar tasks. Furthermore, people with disabilities tend to have higher job satisfaction and employers report having a more positive work environment. The guestion then becomes, how does one break through that barrier of unease and unfamiliarity?

His first assignment 27 years ago was in the Mountain View Precinct (previously Squaw Peak Precinct) where he worked for five years.

Phoenix PD recently reallocated personnel from specialty assignments

to the Patrol Division, resulting in additional, actual officers in the precinct. Though not yet fully staffed, the increase in first responders should help reduce response times to calls and hopefully result in more timely service in the precinct.

Dogs not permitted at large: City of Phoenix Code 8-14, Ordinance G-6292 (March 22, 2017) Violation could yield civil or criminal citation

Officer Ben advises that the leash law is in place to protect ALL citizens and acts as a potential buffer from civil litigation if an off-leash dog attacks another dog or a person. Recently, a woman sustained injuries when a dog off leash ran up to her, knocking her down while a scuffle took place. City parks are heavily violated areas where citizens share responsibility to ensure a safe environment for all. A dog off leash in a city park can create an uncomfortable and an unsafe environment. Please be a responsible dog owner and consider others and the legal consequences of choosing to violate this law. Police efforts have previously focused on compliance through education and documented verbal warnings. A new approach to the initial contact will include a documented warning that, if contacted again and found to be in violation, an appropriate citation will be issued.

Complaints to the Police Department take responders away from more pressing issues. Ben's time is surely better served on property crimes plaguing our neighborhoods.

Apartments and Puppies

Moving my two, older golden retrievers into a high-rise went fairly easily, but when I brought home Sophie, a Goldendoodle puppy, I was reminded daily of the unique responsibilities called for in an apartment!

Check your lease before bringing a puppy home; be prepared to pay a pet deposit. Sophie and I made frequent trips downstairs to the grassy corner to house-train. Some communities allow house-training on the patio, but NEVER leave your dog alone on a patio or balcony! ! Young Sophie jumped over a first floor patio wall before we knew it, luckily landing on soft grass. Even little ones can jump when they put their mind to it!

Exercise your puppy! Exercise creates a healthy bond and tires your puppy before being left for hours. Toys entertain while you're away. Be advised that if your puppy plays with personal items while you're home, they become fair game when you're gone! Bitter apple spray, a natural product available at pet stores or online, discourages chewing.

Check the Arizona Humane Society for tips on handling separation anxiety issues. Puppies left alone can bark because they are calling out to you, which can be disruptive to neighbors in your community.

Keep your puppy on a leash at all times until you are in a safe play area. Dog parks are great for socializing, and more apartment communities are adding this amenity. Most cities also feature off-leash parks for play and socialization.
