


What Is Midtown Neighborhood Association Up to This Summer?

The Midtown Neighborhood Association is ten years old! In July 2018, we celebrate a decade of advocacy on behalf of residents and businesses for a livable and workable Midtown Phoenix! MNA has conducted more than forty community meetings, published close to forty newsletters, growing from a two-sided one-page flyer to the current nationally awarded version of The Midtown MUSE. We've been an active member of the Phoenix Community Alliance and served on the Hance Park Conservancy Board, as well as pulling off eight Sunday Off Central block watch parties and, as of this November, six Midtown Urban Living Tours. And we're still counting!

MNA celebrates partner 850zip in the success of two neighborhood events: the first "Bike Bizarre" provided proof of concept with twenty five repairs by Phoenix Bike Company and one donated bike to Phoenix Spokes People. Food trucks made out well, and District Four wants to partner for future semi-annual events; their eighth annual free "Shredding" event brought 120 families by with over 8,500 pounds of paper and nearly \$775 in donations. With 850zip matching funds, non-profit partners Arizona Animal Welfare League/SPCA and Keep Phoenix Beautiful received \$2,000 in donations - Congratulations!

Central Avenue Public Art

As you're walking up Central Avenue, have you noticed that the streetlights look different? They are – and one of the surviving elements of the 1990 Central Avenue Beautification program.

In the late 1980s, community groups and local leaders wanted to improve Phoenix's main street: Central Avenue. A \$7 million plan funded by 108 businesses in an improvement district spanning from McDowell to Camelback was created to enhance Central. Four hundred palm trees, 500 shade trees, bus shelters, street lights, and other public art were a part of this plan. This was one of the first projects of the then-nascent Phoenix Office of Arts & Culture.

Three artists (Howard Sice of Tucson, Juan and Patricia Navarette of Taos, N.M., and Douglas Weigel of Scottsdale) were chosen to design 300 copper medallions that are 39 inches in diameter. Twenty-two different designs were picked.

Today, while the bus shelters and brick-lined center lane may be gone, light rail has brought new art to Central. Each light rail station has art from a different artist. The Osborn station features bronze footprints leading to the once (and future) Park Central Mall. The Encanto station, with art by the de la Torre brothers, pays homage to Indigenous peoples of the Southwest.

When I moved to Midtown seeking community and synergy in art and culture, Paulina Miller Gallery was my "go to" spot, hugging the original Matt's Big Breakfast and kissing the community church across on 1st Street. When it closed, I thought I would not recover. Then...After Hours Gallery transformed a vacant lot on McDowell Ave into a multi-purpose dwelling with design and gallery space, and the aesthetic of Mike Oleskow. A transplant from Philadelphia, Mike saw what Midtown lacked ...a voice, a story, an artistic engagement with artists. We became fast friends over an Art Detour weekend, and my Midtown neighborhood leadership was in motion, following years later in

his presidential footsteps.

Today Mike is curating and cultivating the bridge between Downtown and Midtown at The FOUND:RE Hotel on Central and Portland. Have you been yet? You should go this summer for a staycation. Mike curates 24/7 art experience, and The Studio has a monthly rotating show opening every First Friday. The lobby, hallways, restaurant, and guest rooms display local original art for sale. More than curator or dealer, Mike is a care tender of the artist narrative. I have watched his eyes light up with passion when inviting a patron to view the work and hear how a particular artist became part of the FOUND:RE family. "I want guests to have an experience, I want them to feel the emotion of the art...we finally have a hotel that embraces the local art scene and a place we can be proud of that people will say...OMG, I wasn't expecting this in Phoenix."

Mike recalls his proudest moment in "The Imitations Pollock show [with elementary students]! Not all students had English as their first language, but through art their voices could be heard. The beauty of art...it doesn't need a language it speaks on its own."

So, take the light rail to the FOUND:RE Hotel to experience Midtown's art scene. Ask Mike for a tour and he will quickly reply, "How much time do you have?"

Using Brains to Impact Education

The Arizona Academy of Science and Technology (AZAST) Team

Have you ever wondered why you know what you know and can recall random memories from your early days of childhood? How about the impact that different colors have on the way you feel, think, and learn? Whether we are talking about metacognition or color psychology, the folks at AZAST are serious about taking knowledge of the human brain and applying it to an impactful learning environment.


Students in kindergarten through eighth grade, who attend AZAST's downtown Phoenix campus at Thomas and 7th Street, experience what happens when brain-based learning drives the educational experience and culture of a school. This is on display from the vibrant color schemes and natural lighting to learning activities that follow the stages of cognitive development, thereby transitioning students from concrete thinkers to rational thinkers.

"Make no brains about it," AZAST believes that education and learning outcomes are positively impacted when a school applies knowledge of the human brain to intentionally and efficiently impact the dynamics, operations, and interactions of an effective day at school. By using summarization strategies to help

promote the transition from short-term to long-term memory and student-driven collaborative work, in the school's Innovation Lab, groups of students replicate real-world simulations enhancing solution-oriented problem solving. AZAST finds that students can achieve more when brain-based learning is at the forefront of constructing a school day and impacting student achievement.



The team at AZAST invites collaboration with education leaders, academic researchers, and community and corporate partners in an effort to further maximize achievement in the classroom using brain-based learning. CodePHX Offers FREE Computer Programming for Youth

CodePHX was created to provide Phoenix youth aged 4-17 the opportunity to obtain knowledge and hands-on computer coding experience and STEM skills [Science, Technology, and Engineering & Math] outside of their school environment. The program is supported by a public-private partnership between the City of Phoenix, Arizona Community Foundation, and the Phoenix Industrial Development Authority.

Since its launch in Summer 2017, more than 1,700 children have attended CodePHX classes. Kids can attend these FREE coding, robotics, and 3D modeling courses at one of 11 public libraries, including Yucca and Palo Verde, or community centers, such as the Bret Tarver Learning Center. This summer the Burton Barr Central Library will join the list of sites hosting classes.

My friend and colleague City Councilman, Daniel Valenzuela, has worked extensively to bring this unique program to life. "There is a gap between our education system and the demands of the future workforce," he said recently. "CodePHX will help close that gap by providing supplemental educational resources to provide opportunities for students, especially those who have been historically disadvantaged, to prepare for the jobs of the future."

There are currently an estimated 10,000 vacant computing jobs in Arizona. Additionally, only 16 of 325 schools in the Phoenix area support a STEM curriculum. CodePHX is simultaneously meeting a demand while offering our youth the chance to compete in a high-tech world and to build essential problem-solving skills. Creating this critical talent and a future workforce pool fills a crucial

need for technology jobs, and opens the door for gainful employment for an entire generation of young people.

CodePHX classes are free, but registration is required at certain locations. Visit phoenix.gov/codePHX for more information on this exciting and groundbreaking program.

CIRCLE / SQUARED Exhibition at Lisa Sette Gallery



Housed in a partly subterranean modernist Al Beadle-designed building, Lisa Sette Gallery's physical space is a study in angles and lines; the real estate website Curbed has referred to Beadle structures as "beautiful boxes." Lisa Sette's expansive gallery is a cool white square angled around a central, altar-like alcove made up of right angles, into which brilliant desert sunlight pours from above.

This summer the gallery celebrates Circle / Squared featuring works that revel in concentricity, bending the straight line toward experimentation and aesthetic gyration: delicate ceramics of surreal objects by Li Mingzhu; eerie photographic portraits by Bettina von Zwehl and Tami Bahat; fantastic and phantasmagoric photo constructions by Luis González Palma, Kahn/Selesnick, Liu Xiaofang; stunning industrial landscapes by Yao Lu; and portraiture mementos in glass cameos by Charlotte Potter, among others.

Yao Lu's landscape photographs, which somewhat resemble the "Floating World" (Ukivo-e) of Japanese 18th Century genre, are photographs documenting vast topographies of industrial detritus. The photographs' circular form is a subversion, as the viewer arrives expecting a quaint historical work: Lu's images instead show in shocking beauty the toxic material of human industry--mountains of rubble and boundless fields of soot.



A circular view may suggest eyeglasses, telescopes and microscopes, binoculars, or peepholes: intimate methods of viewing scenes that may otherwise be beyond our sight. Kahn Selsnick's staged photographs portray a post-apocalyptic world in which humans--unchecked by societal expectations--pursue their own odd social and creative impulses. The viewer becomes time-traveler/voyeur as Kahn/Selesnick's Truppe Fledermaus, a group of travelling performers, engage in mystical antics among the overgrown landscape, and the circular images come to resemble unsettling specimens in a textbook on human behavior.

Lisa Sette Gallery exhibits painting, sculpture, photography, video, installation and performance pieces from an impressive roster of emerging and established artists, as well as maintaining a clientele of local and international collectors devoted to its founder's adventurous curatorial vision.





Midtown History Moment: The U-Haul Towers

Following the end of the Second World War in 1945, newly discharged Navy veteran Leonard "L.S." Shoen and his wife Anna Mary planned a move from Los Angeles to her family's farm in Ridgefield, WA. They tried to rent a trailer to move their possessions, but the only rentals available were for local use, so they could just move what belongings they could fit in their car. During the trip, the Shoens conceived the idea of "rent it here" and "leave it there" one-way rentals and U-Haul was born.


Co-founded by L.S. and Anna Mary in 1945, their business grew steadily, and in just a few years it was possible to rent a trailer from U-Haul in one city and leave it in another throughout the United States and Canada. During the 1950s the Shoens continued to build their business. In 1951 U-Haul was reorganized under a new firm, the Associated Rental Company of America. Anna Mary died in 1957.

In the late 1950s, as Shoen built up his business, Southern Builders of Memphis, Tennessee, began developing a pair of towers, to be called the Central Towers, at the southeast corner of Central Avenue and Roanoke. The north tower, finished in 1959 at 11 stories, was the first high rise office tower north of McDowell Road. It was an immediate hit and soon fully occupied. In 1964 Southern constructed the south tower, connected them at the base, and built a parking structure to the east.

During the 1960s Shoen created AMERCO to hold U-Haul and related subsidiaries. In 1967 he saw opportunity in business-friendly Phoenix and moved the U-Haul corporate offices to the Central Towers. For decades U-Haul maintained a quiet presence on Central Avenue. Shoen continued to grow his firm and even owned the Legend City amusement park for a while. He also was known for some interesting demonstrations, such as the day, to show how easily money could be wasted, he dropped \$1,000 out of his office window onto the street below causing a traffic jam in Midtown Phoenix.



U-Haul remains a family-owned business today with the second and third generations actively managing the company. U-Haul has now taken over the entire Central Towers, which are now named U-Haul Towers, and is growing its presence in Midtown.





This summer the Cutler-Plotkin Heritage Center of the Arizona Jewish Historical Society is hosting two musical programs:

The program features pianist Joel Robin Goldenthal and his sons - bassist Adrian and drummer Julian, and also Stu Siefer on the tenor sax. Joel has been playing in the Valley since 1975 and has a reputation for accompanying many Valley vocalists. Vocalist Delphine Cortez has sung in top jazz clubs in Chicago and is in demand in the Valley since her arrival in the mid-80's. Delphine and Joel's repertoire includes standards and show tunes from the Great American Song Book. Saxophonist Stu Siefer has played with many renowned local jazz musicians and is a member of the Rural Street Klezmer Band and has his own combo which appears at local jazz clubs.

August 19: Shana Bousard and her father will be performing a program of popular American songs. Shana has been professionally involved in music and theatre since 1984.

She obtained her Bachelors of Music from the prestigious Hartt School of Music in West Hartford, Connecticut, and immediately began performing in regional theatres across the country, as well as her solo vocal recital at Carnegie Hall in 1994. Since moving to Arizona in 1995, Shana has performed for many local theatre companies including Arizona Theatre Company and Phoenix Theatre.





These scams come in many forms and are not necessarily focused on a utility problem such as a gas meter / water valve / or electrical box problem. The aim is to lure you out of your house, or even your car. This can be done by a person impersonating a utility worker inviting you to check equipment, a fake sales person offering a service or product to the outside of your home, or any other trick to lure you and your attention away from your property, leaving it unsecured.

Remember, your residence is your castle. No one comes inside unless they are invited. If it feels strange, and looks suspicious, it probably is. Don't get sucked into a sales pitch or a pseudo emergency. Solicitors are required to carry identification, and so are utility workers and contractors. Know what utility companies service your property and neighborhood, and know how to contact them for verification. Do not allow yourself to be lured out of your residence or vehicle, in strange settings that feel abnormal. Distraction is key, and thieves will take advantage of that moment.



City Reminds Landlords of Cooling Ordinance Standards for Phoenix Rental Properties

Last summer, NSD inspectors addressed cooling violations in nearly 20 apartment complexes that affected hundreds of tenants. In summary, the ordinance requires every rental housing unit to safely cool all habitable rooms to a temperature of no greater than 86° F if cooled by evaporative cooling, and no greater than 82° F if cooled by air conditioning. Heating, cooling and ventilation systems in any building are to be maintained hazard-free, operational and in a state of good repair.

"This means residential rental landlords, from houses to apartments, need to monitor and maintain the HVAC

systems on their properties for adequate equipment performance and safe electrical connections," explains Bob Lozier, Code Compliance Manager in the Neighborhood Preservation Division.

"We often see landlords use window air conditioning units as a substitute for a permanent system. In addition to not meeting ordinance requirements for permanently installed cooling systems, window units can create barriers to egress from living areas in emergency situations." Lozier explains.

NSD is also home to the Phoenix Landlord Tenant program to help both landlords and tenants understand their rights under Arizona State Law and Phoenix City Code. Program staff reminds tenants to bring any problems with their cooling or heating systems to the landlord's attention first. However, if the issue isn't fixed in a timely manner, reporting the issue to the NSD Landlord Tenant office allows the city to begin investigating and enforcing the code requirements if the ordinance has been violated.
